campaigning here. No tweeting. No toxic rhetoric. It is probably because we are a small body of like-minded folks, and we have the physical reality of fabric and thread in common.

On many occasions, our conversation is conscientiously limited to fabric and thread; national issues hardly ever come up: political discussion is politely thwarted. I'm not sure that "not going there" is a positive thing. Agreeing to disagree seems just to deepen division. We should not be afraid to express deep concerns to our closest friends. I'd like to think that the good will we share can help us sort through some of the verbiage the mass media throws at us.

When we talk, we should remember that words are not things (even though some of them are heavily weighted with positive or negative connotations). "Just saying" is just that: sound waves in the air. Generalities, inferences, opinions, and judgments all need to come back down to earth. We need to trace those utterances to their origins in verifiable physical realities. Like fabric.

Katie Pedersen believes "Thread is the best glue." I take her to mean that sewists share strong bonds. Because of that, I believe that sewists might be able to mend our social fabric. If we can take our language apart, we can put trust and cooperation back together.

Late fee adopted to encourage on-time renewals

It might seem early to be collecting dues for 2020,

New early habit can really help

but time flies when you're having fun.

Getting all the dues collected *before* the membership year begins on Jan 1, 2020, will help our treasurer have fun, too.

For years the board has sympathized with treasurers who volunteer willingly for a complicated and time-consuming job. The rules of bookkeeping cannot be changed, but the pace of the revenue stream can: we know there is a lot of money changing hands between January


and May because of the quilt show; if renewals can be deposited before January, the pressure on the treasurer can be somewhat eased.

To that end, the board has approved a \$5 penalty for late renewals beginning Jan 1, 2020. Members can pay in person at meetings or by mail; as long as envelopes are postmarked Dec 31, 2019, the dues are still only \$20. After that, renewals are \$25. At this time, no increase in dues is planned for next year, dues are expected to stay \$20.

New members (only) in 2020 will pay the base fee of \$20.


Guest Artist, Yakima's Teresa Silva

I wrote my book with the perspective of what I wished was out there when I started my longarm quilting journey. I enjoy teaching others and sharing my passion of quilting."





Shooting Star [think brown]


I am continually amazed at the seemingly infinite variety of patterns you can get from rearranging squares and half-square triangles!

I don't think we've done a brown quilt yet, so let's concentrate on browns. You will receive a 7" strip of beige/tan color and you will need to provide a 3 ½ x 14" and a 7 x 13" strip of brown accent fabric.


Start by cutting the brown 3-1/2" x 14" strip into four 3-1/2" squares.




Cut the beige/tan color into two 7 x 10 ½" rectangles.
Stack them right side up and cut them into twelve 3-1/2" squares.




Cut the brown 7 x 13" rectangle into four 3-1/2" x 6-1/2" rectangles.



Sew pairs of brown and beige/tan squares right sides together using a 1/4" seam. Press to dark side. Make four units like this...



To make the pieced rectangles, place a beige/tan atop a brown rectangle, right sides together and all edges aligned. On the back of the square draw in the diagonal, then draw a second line 1/2" to the outside of the first line (not shown). Sew on the two lines. Cut between the two lines and save the cut off piece to turn in with the block for a future project. Press the remainder towards the brown. Repeat this with another beige/tan square on the other end of the rectangle as shown in the diagram. Trim these back to be 3-1/2" x 6-1/2" if needed...



Now sew a squarepair to a rectangle unit in a 1/4" seam. Press seam to one side. Make four units like this.... Join the block's four quadrants and it's done! Measure your square. If it is not 12" x 12" then you may not be using a ¼" seam allowance.



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oin us as we celebrate the production of textiles from animal or plant to yarn, to fabric, to a completed product. In this way, we pay tribute to the weavers, quilters and textile artists throughout the ages, by using their drafts and patterns in new and inspiring ways.

The festival includes a multitude of demonstrations and events on Saturday, Oct 19, when live alpaca and sheep will be at the Museum along with many textile-related vendors. See displays of cotton, wool, flax, and fibers suitable for weaving or basketry. White Bluffs will exhibit some historic quilts from its archives and offer classes in traditional quilt and weaving patterns. A children's booth will feature demonstrations by and for children. The first 25 visitors will receive "goodie bags."

Dorothy Mucha, a weaver with 30 years experience, will speak at 11 am Saturday morning. Dorothy's presentation, "Cotton, From Seed to Cloth," will include audience participation, a cotton plant, spinning wheels and seeds.

On Friday Oct 18, White Bluffs will host a "Stash Sale" with fabric, yarns and "all things textile." Buy a raffle ticket for a Baby Lock Aria donated by Discount Vac & Sew in downtown Kennewick. The drawing will be in December.

Sewing mawericks inspire each other in Make It Modern friendship group

ne of the repercussions of the 2013 road show by Ricky Tims and Alex Anderson was Dana Pearson's wish for a "modern" small group. That wish has come true – in spades: the Make It Modern roster contains

Group will share discoveries in October program

20 names, and it is still growing. Even so, travel, appointments, illness, and amnesia allow Cheryl Sunderland's living room to accommodate monthly show/tell/share sessions.

In their efforts to define and describe what makes a quilt modern, the group has designed some collaborative activities for itself. The first took more than a year to run its course: each member chose a fabric and shared it out with instructions to add a fabric of choice to create a block (sometimes colors, sizes, and techniques were stipulated); when the blocks came in, their owners attempted to set them in "modern" shapes and quilt them with "modern" lines.

Other collaborative activities have involved road trips and "sewcials." One was dedicated to monochromatic/mostly log cabinstyle blocks; another ended with a variety of "impressions" of parts of a photo — a high-end library/dining room from a shelter magazine. The most recent, led by Karen Brun, who took a class at Sisters with Karla Anderson, involved experiments with freezer paper piecing and an oval ruler to end up with wonky New York beauty blocks.

Inquiring minds have been attracted to the group. In addition to the usual collegiality and

camaraderie, Make It Modern offers something "interesting and different." One member, who confesses to being "older than dirt," says, "It's how you stay young." The novice quilters in the group appreciate the lack of quilt police. Dana believes the modern movement is forgiving and freeing.

Geneva Carroll has summed and totaled these experiences and added the results of her own research for a presentation that will be illustrated with a trunk show by members at the Guild meeting in October.

Fun Fact: Origin of "Bombast"

Bombast: noun | BAHM-bast DEFINITION: pretentious inflated speech or writing

The original meaning of bombast in English was "cotton or other material used as padding or stuffing." It is derived through Anglo-French bombés or bombace, from a Medieval Latin word meaning "cotton plant, cotton fiber or wadding." Bombax was once thought to be a corruption of bombyx, a Latin (and ultimately Greek) word that means "silkworm" or "silk."

It turns out, however, that bombast's origins are more direct and unassuming: the Latin bombax is not a product of the silky bombyx but was borrowed from the Middle Greek bámbax, pámbax, which in turn probably traces back to the Middle Persian pambak ("cotton").

Bombast is no longer used in the sense of cotton padding or stuffing, but the word has been retained in modern English in a figurative sense referring to speech or writing that is stuffed or padded with pretense and unnecessary verbiage.
