Catherine Spanton lived in the central Washington area from 1981 until 2006. She began working as a Family Nurse Practitioner at the Kanya Clinic/ Urgent Care in Kennewick in 2001. She was a member of VISIONary Textile Artists (VISTA) and the Tri-City Quilters Guild. Through these memberships she developed a passion for Art Quilts and the opportunities here for developing her skills. She married Gordon Bilyard in 2006 and moved to Richland. In 2010 the Bilyards moved to Sequim on the Olympic Peninsula where she fused her art quilting with her new found sport of sailing, and hobbies of photography and travel.

After the death of her husband, Catherine decided to make the move back to Tri-Cities and return to the quilting community that served as the basis of her love of art quilts. In May she became the Washington Regional Representative for Studio Art Quilt Associates. Inc. (SAQA), an international organization of Art Quilters. She is going to share with us her journey into Art Quilting, and "What is SAQA and why SAQA"?

2023 Quilt Show Challenge

— ILLUSION QUILTS —

The 2023 Quilt Show challenge is on! Entries for the challenge must reflect an **ILLUSION**. Examples include:

- ◆ **A 3D effect** created by the use of color, value, or shape (e.g. tumbling blocks).
- ◆ **Transparency:** use color and value to create the illusion that one fabric is showing through another fabric overlapping it.
- ◆ **Piecing** that gives the impression of movement, hidden images, flashing and vibration, patterns, or alternatively, of swelling or warping.
- ◆ **An optical illusion** (e.g. an Escher drawing).

Any shape, any fabric, any embellishment is allowed, but all entries must reflect the theme of **ILLUSION**.



There is no minimum size. Maximum circumference is 180 inches. All entries must be 3 layers (held together by quilting or tying) and have finished edges.



Entries are due by March 1, 2023. Drop off locations TBA later.



Remember to keep your project a secret - voting will be held at the March 2023 meeting. Winners will be announced at the quilt show. Have fun!

Guild workshop 2023

In January, Connie Spurlock from Sew Wonderful Dreams will host a Batik Jacket Workshop on Tuesday Jan 17 at White Bluffs from 10-3. Signups will start at the November meetings. Cost will be \$50. Students will bring a sweatshirt to be transformed into a jacket. The workshop kit includes the jacket pattern and 22 wedges of 22" long batiks which will do most of the jacket. Students should bring batiks they might want to also put in the jacket. They may or may not use them but at least will have them available. Connie will have skeins of glitzy yarns and/or piping that may be used. Ribbons can also be used to accentuate the jacket.

Connie will also present information on how to streamline several projects at the January guild meeting.

Show quilt registration is approaching. Are you ready?

The quilt show committee is working hard to bring you our 2023 quilt show. We will once again be using the online quilt registration interface to register quilts in the show.

You will be asked to enter your email and password which you will use for all your quilt entries. If you are new to registration, you will create an account. If you have forgotten your password from 2022, there is a button to recover it.

There will be several categories for registering your quilt, including "Take Flight", "Illusion Quilts Challenge", workshops, collaborations, and other categories.

The guild will use a ranking system if we have more quilts than we can hang. Members will be asked to enter their quilts in ranked order, i.e., the first quilt you enter will be the highest rank among your quilts. If we have to remove quilts, the last one you enter will be considered your lowest ranked quilt and could be selected for removal.

Registration will open on January 1, 2023, at 12:01AM. Start planning now to prepare for quilt registration. If you have any questions, please contact Nancy Graves, at nancyjg@charter.net.

Quilt Show Taking Flight with Substitute Pilot

Due to Dee Leigey's family's planned move to Kansas, she has stepped away from her Guild job as Quilt Show Chair; I have come out of retirement to finish getting her show off the ground.

Dee has set us up with an interesting notion for the theme category. Pieces with birds and bees are in progress, I have heard. Of course, there will be edifying allusions to imagination taking flight. And there may even be some scary/Halloween entries: the first meaning of "take flight" in the online Merriam-Webster dictionary is "to run away in fright."

The Guild challenge was issued in June by Linda Weir. Our featured artist is engaged – longarm Susan Smith. Our member artist is chosen – Louise Peterson. The raffle quilt is traveling to venues in the community and earning revenue.

The PR machine has cranked up. Katie Harris and Tina Foley delivered some bookmarks to the Spokane show. Later this month, save-the-date postcards will be sent to guilds, groups, and quilt stores in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. In January, we'll buy the big ads in The Country Register and The Entertainer.

Toward the end of the year, we'll be testing the online registration so it can go live on January 1, 2023, along with the volunteer sign-up sheet (both accessible via the website—tcquilters.org).

Here's what everyone can do to help:

- ◆ Sew like crazy – quilts for exhibit and/or sale (profit to you), potholders for sale (profit to Guild).
- ◆ Purge your sewing supplies (patterns, tools, fabric,

UFOs) and donate them to the Round Tuit Room. Contact Cheryl Garrison and/or Elaine Brouillard; they will collect items at member meetings.

- ◆ Check out raffle tickets! Buy them yourself or sell them to family, friends, neighbors. Contact Cyndy Underwood or Nancy Graves.
- ◆ Join the road sign sisters; suggest a Scout group or high school service club that might help us place and collect them and/or help us locate the most-travelled streets in your city. Contact Jean Keaveney.
- ◆ Be on the lookout for opportunities to advertise, in print or online. The death of local news has put organizations like ours in a painful place. Contact me or Dianne Cramer.
- ◆ If you have quilting friends or family in the region, invite them for the weekend of the show! Especially if they are young and strong, they can help with frame set-up on Thursday and take-down on Saturday. Then you can cook a big breakfast Sunday and send them home.

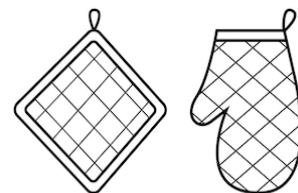


Pot holders fundraiser

509-591-1973 and leave a message. The pairs of potholders that have been donated so far are so cute and fun! Let's see what *you* can make!



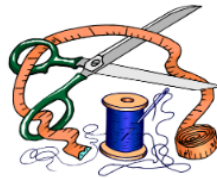
In other news...

Community Service backlog dwindles

It looks like we will have another banner year for community service quilts distributed. Our total through October is 275. We have added Richland Police Department to our list of agencies.

As some of you know, there is a huge backlog of tops that needed quilting. I came up with an incentive to encourage members to take the quilt bundles home to quilt. The incentive is working! In September 59 quilts were turned in. I can't remember a month in the last few years that that amount was turned in in one month. October saw 25 quilts turned in. This has made a small dent in the backlog of tops.

The incentive? Members who have quilted Community Service quilts that are turned in during the months of September, October, and November will be eligible for the drawing. The prize is a \$50 gift certificate from E. E. Schenck. The drawing will be at the December Day meeting. Good luck, and keep on quilting! — *Cyndy*

November 2 (Wednesday) from 10 to 2: In conjunction with the **Quilts from Another Angle** exhibit (which ends on December 29), Laurel Sutton will teach **Improv Triangles**, where random cuts create all sorts of acute and obtuse corners. The tricky part is laying them out. She's got solutions. Sign up and pre-pay \$28 at the Museum.



November 25-26 (Friday and Saturday) from 10-4: Black Friday bargains will be on offer. Donations of fabric, patterns, tools, and other textile-related items will be discounted for sale. Shop the consignment area for Christmas giving.

December 3 (Saturday) from 1 to 3: The annual holiday gathering climaxes with the raffle drawing; the Baby Lock Symphony donated by Discount Vac & Sew will go home with a lucky winner.

January 6 (Friday): **Stitched Embellishment**, opens the 2023 exhibit season. If you have quilts or other pieces enhanced by embroidery, lace, rickrack, buttons, beads, or other additions, contact exhibit coordinator Laurel Grove – lkgprs@hal-pc.org – by December 15; they will hang through April. Other exhibits will be **Going Around in Quilting Circles** (May through August) and **Ethnic Influences** (September through December). This final exhibit will resume the tradition of 18 x 18 challenges that were interrupted by covid. Watch and listen for more details in December.

January 21 through 28 (Saturday through Saturday): The 9th annual Local Shop Hop will continue its pandemic pattern, expanding to a full week and allowing leisurely visits to outlying quilt shops in Walla Walla, College Place, Athena, Hermiston, and Prosser, as well as the Tri-Cities. Passports go on sale January 2. Watch and listen for more details in December.

Officer Job Descriptions

Note from the editor: To give members a background of possible roles in the Guild, as space allows, job descriptions will be published as found in Appendix A of the TCQG Policies and Procedures Manual, dated 1/7/2011. We begin with the Executive Officers.

Below is a description of the jobs required to successfully run the Guild. The duties of each job may be changed and revised without the ratification of the general membership. Additional guidelines, hints and directions for each job are available in the individual Committee Notebook that is passed to each committee chair.

I. EXECUTIVE OFFICERS (Voting position on Executive Board)

Requirements: Be an active member of the Guild. "Active" is defined as:

- Attends monthly Executive Board meetings
- Attends monthly AM and/or PM meetings and/or submits report
- Pays annual dues

PRESIDENT

1. Assumes responsibility for the supervision and general management of the Guild.
2. Prepares Board meeting agendas.
3. Presides at Board meetings and the Annual Business Meeting.
4. Ex-officio member of all committees, except the Nominating Committee.
5. Performs any other duties incidental to the position.

AM/PM VICE-PRESIDENTS

1. Assists the President as deemed necessary.
2. Presides over the AM/PM meetings, respectively.
3. Performs the duties of President when necessary.
4. Performs any other duties incidental to the position.

GUILD SECRETARY:

1. Records the minutes of the Executive Board meetings and the Annual Meeting.
2. Assumes responsibility for any correspondence that does not relate specifically to an activity or responsibility of another Board position.
3. Keeps and maintains an updated version of the Policies &

Procedures and Bylaws.

4. Maintains a filing system of all Guild documents including but not limited to:
 - Bylaws
 - Articles of Incorporation
 - Policies & Procedures Manual
 - Minutes (Board Meeting-AM Meeting-PM Meeting-Annual Meeting)
 - Contracts
 - Treasurer's Reports
5. Performs any other duties incidental to the position.

TREASURER

1. Is available at the annual Quilt Show to receive ticket money and to make regular deposits throughout the show.
2. Is available to members for prompt reimbursement for expenses submitted.
3. Leaves the checkbook and records with the President who is authorized to sign checks and pay bills, in the event the treasurer must be out of town.
4. Secures bonding for the position of Guild Treasurer, President and Vice-Presidents
5. Collects dues and other receivables and maintain the funds of the Guild in a bank, approved by the Executive Board.
6. Disburses monies for all budgeted items.
7. Prepares required monthly reports.
8. Prepares an annual financial report that shall be published for the general membership.
9. Chairs the Budget Committee that will prepare the budget for the coming year. The budget shall be presented to the Executive Board and the General Membership for approval by the December Annual Meeting.
10. Files required forms with the federal and state agencies.
11. Maintains files including but not limited to:
 - Monthly Treasurer's Reports
 - Bank Reconciliation Reports
 - Federal Income Tax Return (Form 990)
12. Facilitates an annual audit of the books by an auditor outside of the Guild. (conflict with Audit Committee but this job description was approved by the Board-need to change)
13. Performs other duties incidental to the office.

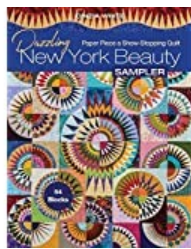

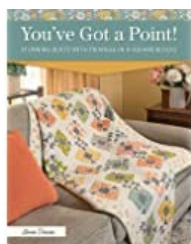

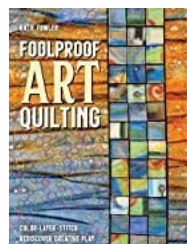
