I've been struggling these days to come up with something to keep us all connected. To that end, I would like to announce a Grocery Bag Contest. Washington State Senate Bill 5323 will ban plastic grocery bags as of Jan 1, 2021, so we are all going to need grocery bags, and with our sewing and quilting skills we should have the best bags around.

This is a contest for the prettiest and most functional grocery bag. I will be awarding two prizes:

- One for the best design and
- One for the prettiest grocery bag

I will be the judge. The key word for this contest is "FUNCTIONAL." A bag made from 400 yoyos might be pretty but
it won't make it out of the starting blocks.

Drop off for your entry June 22 through June 26 at either Quiltmania in Richland or Discount Vac \& Sew in Kennewick. Make sure and label your bag with your name and phone number. Two bags per person limit.

The winners will be announced either in the newsletter or at a meeting depending on how things go. The prize for the winners is not decided yet. I have included the plans for $m y$ perfect bag. You can use that or your own design. The drawings were done by hand as I had to modify a design for my own tastes.

## Pretty Good Grocery Bag Directions

## This pattern is a combination of an online free pattern (link below) and modifications I made to it. It also had no instructions so I had to piece it together (pun intended).

- Fabric $1 \frac{1}{4}$ yards of heavy fabric (duck cloth, canvas, faux leather, outdoor fabric, etc) I used outdoor fabric from the clearance rack that was 55 " wide.
- Cut the following WOF strips:
- One 13" strip
- Subcut into one $13^{\prime \prime} \times 43^{\prime \prime}$ strip (bag front/back)


## - Two 9" strips

- Subcut 1 strip into one $9^{\prime \prime} \times 47^{\prime \prime}$ strip (bag sides)
- Subcut the 2nd strip into the shape shown in figure (bottom reinforcement)
- Two $31 / 2 \prime$ strips
- Subcut into two $31 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 47^{\prime \prime}$ strips (reinforcing straps)
- Two $23 / /^{\prime \prime}$ strips
- Subcut into four $23 / 4 \times 18^{\prime \prime}$ strips (handles)




## MAIN BAG ASSEMBLY

1. Lay the 13 " strip wrong side up
2. Lay the reinforcing strip and bag side wrong sides up and centered over the bottom strip. You can place the reinforcement strip at any layer, your choice.
3. Pin through all layers and sew around all raw edges both right side and wrong side. Don't sew the side seams yet.

# The Challenge of S矿Ack 

Old movies, tuxedos, piano keys, and checkered flags. These and many other iconic images are visually defined by the dramatic contrast of black and white. The Sewciety Girls friendship group proposed next year's challenge as a striking compliment to the show theme.

Picture a corner that stands out because of its lack of color, just the way a masquerade can be simply stunning or a herd of zebras blends into a gorgeous Zentangle. That's what Sewciety has in mind.

Because not everyone wants just a black and white quilt, we have allowed one caveat: One color may be included as long as it is not more than $25 \%$ of the overall design.

## There are just four basic rules:

1. The item must be at least $75 \%$ black and white.
2. One additional color is allowed (but only one).
3. Any shape, any fabric, any embellishment is allowed, but all must follow the theme.
4. Maximum circumference of 160 inches.
5. Prints can be used but must "read" as black, white, or your chosen color.
As far as shades/tones/tints of your color... we are looking at the overall effect of many B\&W quilts displayed together with bright spots of color. Your chosen highlight does not have to be a primary hue, but we would like you to choose a color and stick with it.

Whether you think of yourselves as pirates or prisoners of Pantone, we are sure your creativity and talent for shape and texture will create a fascinating display - and we can't wait to see it!

## Presenting: Postcard Project for the 2021 Quilt Show

## "The weather is here, wish you were beautiful!"

We are asking Guild members to make and donate post cards to be sold at the 2021 Quilt Show as a fund raiser. In order to assure that the postcards can be mailed, the following requirements and limits are provided:

- Postcards must be 4 " $\times 6$ " and no thicker than 1/8 inch
- Postcards MUST consist of 3 layers
- A decorated top layer of fiber such as fabric, paper or other textile fiber
- A middle firmer layer such as "fast2fuse," peltex, timtex, or cardboard
- A backing of muslin or light-colored solid fabric that can be written on
- It must have a clean finished edge, such as a zigzag stitch, satin stitch, or a narrow binding.
- Write your name and date on the back of the card in an inconspicuous place with permanent pen.

This is a chance for members to experiment with different surface design techniques, such as inks, paints, Shiva sticks, photo printing on fabric, stamping, etc..

Due to the requirement that postcards be no thicker than $1 / 8$ of an inch, the use of batting is discouraged.

I will be the lead on this project and questions can be sent to me at mintonba@ hotmail.com. However, because the COVID-19 pandemic, Geneva and I have not be able to meet to work out additional details. We will be putting more information on the website, including some PDF
files of postcard backs that can be printed on to fabric. So, stay tuned as the project develops.

## Art \& Design: water, feed, then stand back

Hello! My name is Jan Yancey. "I'm a painter, a designer and I quilt."

Last spring Handi Quilter advertised a request to send in a 3 minute video of quilters using this fill- in- the- blank phrase to describe themselves. They then chose 14 people to represent geographical areas of the US and Canada. I was one of them! They flew the winners to Salt Lake City, all expenses paid, where we were met by a fancy limousine to take us to their headquarters and confetti and balloon welcome first thing inside the door! They continued treating us like royalty all week long.

Every day we were taught by professionals in the field of quilting on our individual machines. Every night they shuttled us to a local quilt store where they gave us credit to spend on anything in the store. (I was forced to buy fabric!) At the end of the week they sent us home with hundreds of dollars worth of quilting products, not the least of which was a sewing machine! Then a few months later, they came here to my home in Richland where they interviewed and videotaped me for 11 hours. My ads are just now starting to appear on their website, in magazines (Spring issue of Quilters World) and you can see my video at handiquilter.com/jan-yancey. They will continue using them in their advertising for the next 2-3 years.

It still seems like an impossible dream to me that I was chosen! Especially since

I almost didn't even send in my application! After all, who would want to hear anything from me, right! (says everyone's negative voice in your head on occasion!) I waited until the day before the deadline to even start making my video. I look back now and I'm so grateful I didn't listen to my fears and those negative voices! I could have lost out on one of the

When Handi-Quilter ads featured Jan Yancey of Richland, we didn't know her. She has since found us! She followed the White Bluffs Local Shop Hop itinerary, discovered places she never knew about, and joined the Guild. Get to know her at handiquilter.com/ian-yancey.


Every great piece of art starts with a great idea - but if it stays hidden in the ground of your brain it will wither and die. Amazing seeds of design need to be let out into the sunshine, watered and nourished and encouraged to blossom! True,
most amazing experiences of my life.
I've thought a lot about why I was chosen and I'm reminded of something a good friend once said about me. She said, "If the Navy needed a battleship, Jan could knit one and it would float!"

Interestingly, I don't actually knit! But..... I do have a "particular set of skills!" I taught painting for 26 years and I can create or design just about anything. A lot of what I know about art and design came from that background. Color theory in fabric is exactly the same in paint. And the elements of design apply to quilting the same as they do in watercolor. We just use needles and thread instead of a paintbrush to make the magic happen.

## STRAP ASSEMBLY

1. Fold a $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ strip in half right sides together \& sew into a tube.
2. Turn the tube inside out and press. This may be difficult if the fabric is stiff. You can do it, the tube is fairly wide and you can make it as wide as you wish.
3. Sew the straps onto the 13 " side as shown in the photo. Trim flush.
4. Sew the side seams together forming the bag, right sides together, with $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ seams.

5. Turn the bag inside out.
6. Finish off the raw edge on top of the bag by sewing on a double-fold bias strip. Or make your own strip from contrasting fabric. Or just zig-zag the edge if the kids are screaming and you just want it done. It's a shopping bag, not a prom dress.


## HANDLE ASSEMBLY

1. Lay the two $23 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ strips on top of each other right sides together.
2. At this point I center a $6^{\prime \prime}$ piece of heavy interfacing on top to make a thick handle that does not cut into your hand.
3. Sew all around the side seams leaving a 3 " gap on one side to turn the handle inside out.
4. Sew the open seam closed after turning.
5. If you use a piece of interfacing for thickness (or other stiffener) fold both sides of the center portion under half way and sew down to create a thick handle.
6. Sew the completed handles to the top of the straps completing the bag!!!

## Letter from local United Way

The following letter was received recently. Stay updated on mask requests, patterns and success stories on the Guild's Facebook page.

Hello! I am Shanna with United Way of Benton and Franklin Counties, and I was wondering if we would be able to partner up with your organization in an effort to get masks out to nonprofits who provide critical services. Local services have been "on hold" during the stay-at-home period. When they re-open they will need masks so they can safely provide these services to our community.

Although these nonprofits will be working in close contact with at-risk populations every day, they are not
 eligible for N95 or surgical masks because we must prioritize access to those masks for frontline healthcare providers who work with COVID-19 patients.

We are joining the upcoming statewide effort, promoted by the Governor's office, to rally local sewing brigades to make and distribute face masks. We are going to be using our volunteer platform to provide the information on where the demand is so those that can supply the face masks know how many are needed.

I see on your Facebook you have had requests in the past from companies for masks and were able to get them distributed. Do you have people volunteering to make masks and looking for places to donate them? If so, our platform may be an additional resource to help connect those making masks with those organizations in our community that need them.

Is this something that you might be willing to promote among your members? If so, I would be happy to provide you with additional information on the statewide campaign and our volunteer website.
